KidsClick! Ages 8+	<a href="http://www.kidsclick.org">www.kidsclick.org</a>	Supported by librarians, this site lists about 5,000 web sites organized in different categories.
Zoodles Ages 3+	<a href="http://www.zoodles.com">www.zoodles.com</a>	Lets younger kids get a sampling of age-appropriate web content, including games and videos. The application selects content for kids based on age (up to age 8 or third grade), skill level, and special needs. Users can only get to pre-approved sites (such as Disney and American Girl), and are prevented from exploring parts of those sites that haven't been added to the content rotation. A premium version of the application (\$7.95 per month or \$59.95 per year) gives parents access to special features, including the ability to monitor kids' activities, block ads, and customize content
KidInfo Age 6+	<a href="http://www.kidinfo.com">www.kidinfo.com</a>	Parents need to know that kids can use this site -- which features links to other sites -- to get homework help for all kinds of subjects. Started by a teacher and organized by specific curriculum covered in schools for different ages, the site of culled resources is broken down into sections and subsections and the links are listed in a grid format, which makes scanning them easy. According to the site, the links are checked weekly and any dead links are removed. There are some Google-sponsored ads.
Kiddle Age 8+	<a href="http://www.kiddle.com">www.kiddle.com</a>	Parents need to know that Kiddle is a search engine that's designed to provide safe search results for kids. The site is designed to block profanity and other questionable words from search results. But some violent content can still be found depending on the search results, such as those on TV shows or hunters. Alcohol- or drug-related searches provide factual results that don't endorse or promote use or abuse. Some search results may lead to sales-based sites and may also feature search-based ads on results pages. Parents should also know that if they come across any questionable websites, they can submit a request to have Kiddle block them. Users can also request certain keywords be banned
FactMonster Age 9+	<a href="http://www.factmonster.com">www.factmonster.com</a>	Parents need to know that this well-organized, kid-friendly mega resource is the place to go for fun facts and homework help. It's brought to you by educational professionals, so no need to worry about the content. The multiple ads per page are the only annoying thing to be found.
DuckDuckGo Age 10+	<a href="http://www.duckduckgo.com">www.duckduckgo.com</a>	Parents need to know that DuckDuckGo is a search engine that may be safer for your kids than its competitors are. But don't let the cute cartoon duck fool you into thinking it's completely safe. Kids can still search for words like "porn," but the links they click won't be saved. Normal search engines grab lots of information from each search, and on the off chance a site gets hacked, an accidental leak occurs, or the government wants your whole Web history, the fact that you visited a certain site could become public.

KidzSearch.com Age 10+	<a href="http://www.kidzsearch.com">www.kidzsearch.com</a>	Parents need to know that KidzSearch.com is a search engine that's supposed to be tailored to provide safe, adult-content-free search results. Sexually charged terms and curse words are blocked. Some graphic details from news articles or commentary about drinking may be stumbled upon, since many articles found in searches are taken from news sites. Parents should be aware that ads are placed on every page, and Google ad results appear at the top of results as well.
SweetSearch Age 13+	<a href="http://www.sweetsearch.com">http://www.sweetsearch.com</a>	Parents need to know that SweetSearch is a search engine for students that pulls from 35,000 pre-screened Websites to ensure results are valid and credible sources of information. However, among the approved sites are college and university publications, where student writers sometimes publish articles with discussions of drug and alcohol use, descriptions of sexual acts, and profanity. In addition, kids could encounter crime scene photos or disturbing historical images on some of the sites.
GoogleScholar Age 15+	<a href="http://scholar.google.com">http://scholar.google.com</a>	Parents need to know that this Web search engine from Google is limited to scholarly works and contains no ads. There's no inappropriate content, but the material indexed is too challenging for younger users.
